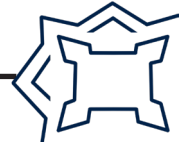


ANALYZING PERSIFOR FRAZER'S LETTER



GRADES 6-8

OVERVIEW

Students will read a letter from Major Persifor Frazer to his wife Polly, written at Ticonderoga on September 21, 1776 then answer a series of questions. A map of Ticonderoga and Mount Independence is also provided for context.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to:

- * Read and analyze a primary source document
- * Make inferences using context clues
- * Answer questions based on information in the letter
- * Incorporate background knowledge of the geography of Ticonderoga

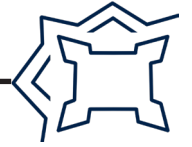

INTRODUCTION

In the summer of 1776 Persifor Frazer was promoted to major in the Fourth Pennsylvania Battalion under the command of Colonel Anthony Wayne. The Fourth Pennsylvania Battalion was raised in Chester County, southwest of Philadelphia. While at Ticonderoga, Major Frazer wrote a series of letters to his wife, Polly.

- * Map of Fort Ticonderoga and Mount Independence (1777)

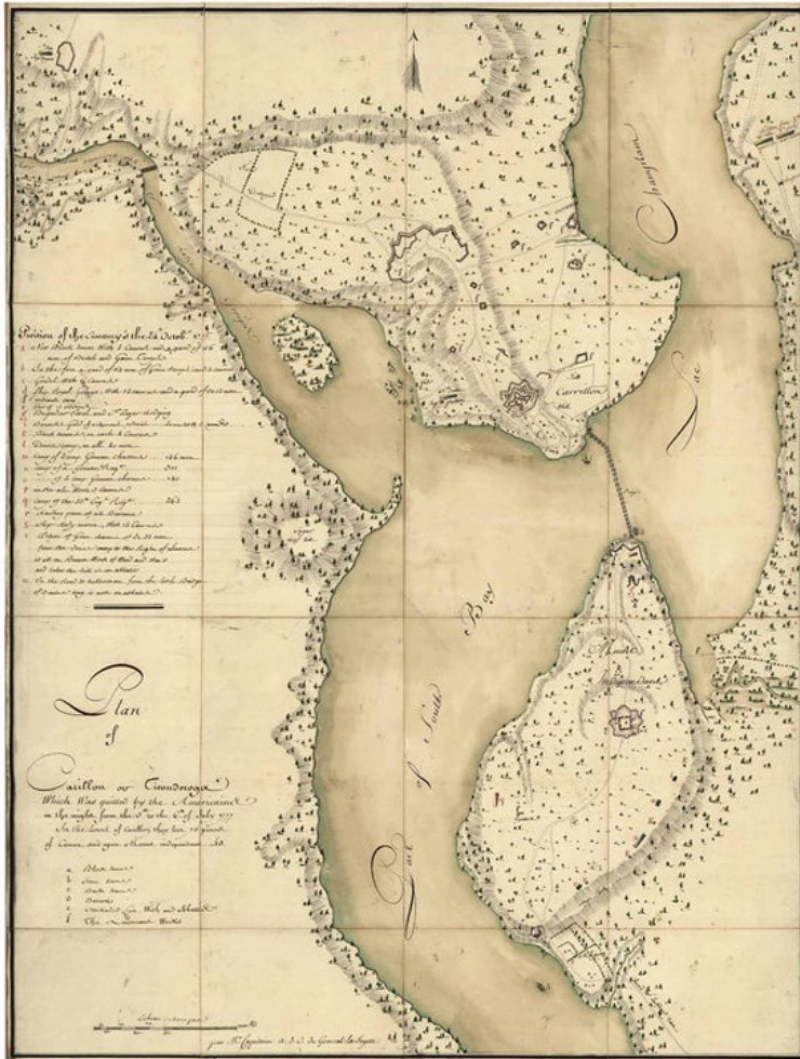

A LETTER FROM PERSIFOR FRAZER TO HIS WIFE POLLY WRITTEN AT TICONDEROGA ON SEPTEMBER 21, 1776

I was yesterday with Captain Christy and Captain Robinson upon Mount Independence, the other side of the lake where most of the New Englanders are encamped. Upon our return in the evening we were obliged to wait a short time for a boat that was coming over. When it came to shore and the passengers were landing I espyed our servant Jacob Down that ran away from us. I laid hold of him and asked him if he knew me. He said he had never seen me before. When I told him my name, after a considerable time, he thot proper to recollect me. He had enlisted in Massachusetts where I understand he was born. I brot him over with me; his Captain came over shortly after. He and I today have been agreeing on his price. I believe I shall get 51 dollars for him which is the sum he cost me.
