at Fort Ticonderoga Mars Education Center May 19, 2023, 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Fort Ticonderoga hosts the Twelfth Annual History Conference for Educators on Friday, May 19, 2023, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Mars Education Center. This year's day-long conference features presentations from historians, curators, museum educators, documentary producers, and classroom teachers.

8:30-9:00—Registration and Coffee

9:00-9:15—Welcome and Introductions

9:15-9:45—"Exploring Newly Digitized Manuscripts in the Ticonderoga Collection related to the French & Indian War and the American Revolution."

Rich Strum, Director of Academic Programs at Fort Ticonderoga, and Tim Potts, teacher at Monticello Central School, share how to access hundreds of new documents available through the Ticonderoga Online Collections Database for use in the classroom.

10:00-10:50—"The Broad Side of a Barn?: Musketry Myths of the Revolutionary Era"

Technological advances in the 1800s have reflected poorly on the era of flintlock musketry that dominated the battlefields of the world from the 17th to the 19th centuries. Based in Fort Ticonderoga's extensive collection, Curator Dr. Matthew Keagle will explore how the arms that brought down empires and overthrew kings were made and used, providing a greater appreciation for these powerful artifacts in the course of history and dispelling the myths and misconceptions that have collected around them.

11:00-11:25—"The Weapons of War"

Following up on Dr. Keagle's presentation, Fort Ticonderoga's Living History Staff gives a demonstration of the loading and firing of muskets based on the manual of arms used by soldiers garrisoned at Fort Ticonderoga in 1760.

11:30-12:30—Lunch Break

12:30-3:00—"Benedict Arnold: Hero Betrayed"

The afternoon program revolves around the new documentary "Benedict Arnold: Hero Betrayed" and includes an overview of Arnold's Revolutionary career, strategies for using clips from the documentary in the classroom, and a discussion with the documentary's maker.

12:30-1:00—Who is Benedict Arnold?

Author and Historian James Kirby Martin discusses Benedict Arnold's military career.

1:00-1:45—Clips from "Benedict Arnold: Hero Betrayed"

Teacher Tim Potts (Monticello Central School District) and Rich Strum, Director of Academic Programs, share clips, and strategies for using them, with key primary sources from the Ticonderoga Collection.

2:00-2:45 A Conversation with Producer Tom Mercer

Tom Mercer talks about making the documentary "Benedict Arnold: Hero Betrayed," how to access the documentary in the classroom, and answers questions.
