his issue of *The Haversack* highlights our 2023 annual focus, 1760, which, at Ticonderoga, is a largely forgotten campaign. That year Ticonderoga held an important role as it supported the British victories in North America.

Just as Ticonderoga in 1760 sat at a remote yet critical center of the global war, today we are situated again in a very special position as an international destination, a national touchstone,



and center of learning, both on-site and virtually through our Center for Digital History.

You'll read about programs that encourage exploration, analysis, and inquiry for people of all ages and backgrounds including our pre-service teacher programs which engage the next generation

Forgotten Victories to Global War

FOR TICONDEROGA, 1760 is largely a forgotten campaign. No longer on the front line, the fort served to support the British advance to Canada along Lake Champlain and was lightly guarded by just two New York Independent Companies. Prior to 1755, they were the only British regulars in all of North America, but as thousands of regular regiments were shipped to the colonies, they became an anachronism, and were used to garrison various forts behind the front lines. The war would fundamentally change Britain's colonial military policies, but it was not yet over in 1760.

A new exhibit for 2023, "Success: The End of the Seven Years' War," explores the final campaigns of the Seven Years' War. Many Americans are less familiar with the end of the war. Fighting in North America largely ended with the fall of New France in 1760, but the global war continued and even expanded through 1763. From the Caribbean to the Philippines, British forces fought their colonial rivals,

France and Spain, while intense fighting continued in Europe from Portugal to Pomerania.

Britain's staggering successes left the nation managing a very different empire than when the war began. French Canadians, Native American, and Spanish colonists in Florida all now found themselves under British rule. The few Independent Companies would no longer suffice to maintain security and reflect British power over this vast domain, and they were disbanded in 1763. But British management of their new empire, a direct result of the success of British forces globally, created and revealed tensions with the colonies that eventually led to the American Revolution.

While two Independent
Companies garrisoned
Ticonderoga in 1760 three armies
succeeded in simultaneously
converging on Montreal across
thousands of miles of farmlands,
wilderness, lakes, and rivers.
On September 9, 1760, the
outnumbered French yielded to
the overwhelming British forces
and delivered up the colony after
seven years of grueling war.



When They Were Young

Horatio Gates commanded one of the Independent Companies that garrisoned Fort Ticonderoga in 1760. The future Continental Army General, survived the Battle of the Monongahela in 1755, but in 1760 entrusted his company's command to his subordinates while he served as a Brigade Major in Pennsylvania. He eventually settled in Virginia after the French and Indian War ended.

The 17th Regiment of Foot spent the winter of 1759-60 split between Ticonderoga and Fort George. The regiment's adjutant Lieutenant **Richard Montgomery** accompanied the regiment on Lake Champlain in 1760, and through the Caribbean to Havana. He mustered out of the British Army in 1772 and emigrated to America. Montgomery accepted a Continental Commission as a Brigadier General in 1775. After re-ascending the Champlain Valley he was killed in the failed assault on Quebec City, December 31.

The other company at Ticonderoga in 1760 was commanded by Captain **Allan MacLean**, who had survived the disastrous 1758 Battle of Carillon. Unlike Gates, MacLean continued his rise in the British Army ending the war in command of new Highland Regiment. In 1775 he offered to raise former Scottish soldiers in America on behalf of the Crown, known as the Royal Highland Emigrants. He was critical to the British defense of Quebec, where Montgomery was killed.



Havana


▲ With New France subdued, thousands of troops left America starting in 1762 bound for the Caribbean. The ultimate prize was Havana, Cuba, which the British captured in August. Among them was Captain Philip Skene, who developed Skenesborough (modern day Whitehall, N.Y.). This is his commission as Town Major, which made him third in command of the captured Spanish city.

Success!

▼ British success was quite literally toasted across the globe. Manufacturers rode the wave of popular sentiment producing products that appealed to the popularity of British and allied commanders like Admiral Edward Hawke and Frederick the Great. Some of this material was even found at Ticonderoga, like this punchbowl base.



American Uniform: British Soldiers

Meet our artificers and examine swatches of English wool cloth and stout American buckskin to explore evolving military dress at Ticonderoga. Soldiers of the New York Independent companies wore these green wool jackets along with buckskin breeches and "Indian hose," or Native American styled wool leggings. By 1760 the British Army in North America, identified itself as the American Army, with pragmatic customs and clothing apart from their colleagues back across the Atlantic.





■ Each shoe is a detective story that unfolds stitch-by-stitch. Enjoy moments of discovery as archaeological fragments become footwear.



Victory Garden

Tour our soldiers' garden this summer to see the diverse vegetables of the original Victory Garden. In 1760, the British Army sent an array of seeds including celery, pumpkin, cauliflower, watermelon, potatoes and more. The British even planted asparagus—a perennial requiring years to get full crop—symbolizing the confidence and success of British Arms across a continent.

◀ In 1760, British soldiers enjoyed the taste of success. Try sowing seeds and plucking weeds in our soldiers' garden.

ROW TO REVOLUTION


The last campaign into French Canada was also a Row to Revolution for many American provincials. Learn about the tensions as you visit our Boat House to see Massachusetts provincial soldiers fitting out vessels big and small for the final campaign down Lake Champlain in 1760. As mallets drive pungent tar-soaked hemp fibers between planks, you'll hear how the 155-ton Duke of Cumberland had to be recaulked to stay afloat. Try planing a pine plank, and watch repairs to bateaux damaged by foul weather in the fall of 1759.



A New Exhibit Explores History Beneath the Waves

"Underwater Ticonderoga: Archaeology from the King's Shipyard," opening this spring, will share exciting finds from the 2019 survey of the King's Shipyard. After capturing Fort Carillon in July 1759, the British quickly established a shipyard at the newly named Ticonderoga to counter French naval presence on Lake Champlain. Vessels such as the sloop *Boscawen* and the brig *Duke of Cumberland* patrolled the waters of the lake, mooring at Ticonderoga's docks and in 1760, even provided housing for officers. Learn more about the shipyard's history and artifacts starting this May!

► The King's Shipyard has produced an array of artifacts from ship rigging to tools and personal artifacts, like this chisel and pewter bowl. The anaerobic environment of the lake helps preserve a variety of materials such as wood, metals, and even textiles.




Forge of an Empire

Fort Ticonderoga has received crucial funding from the Preservation League of New York State to support a building condition survey of the historic smith's forge masonry wall located in the Lower Town!

Shortly after establishing Fort Carillon, the French army began the construction of a series of ancillary structures south of the fort beginning in early 1756. This area, known as the Lower Town, or the French Village, housed a number of proto-industrial structures that supported the military activities of the army. Following the British capture of the fort, "a Brew House & Smith's Forge" were added by 1761. This grant will provide the first step in preservation and stabilization of a significant piece of 18th-century architecture on Fort Ticonderoga's historic landscape!



The Technical Assistance Grant program is a partnership between the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) and the Preservation League of New York State, made possible by NYSCA with the support of the Office of the Governor and the New York State Legislature with additional support from the Maurice D. Hinchey Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area.



Interns From the Green Mountains!

Funding from the Alma Gibbs Donchian Foundation is providing Vermont's Castleton University students the opportunity to learn collections management skills and sharpen their research abilities through the cataloging of archaeological collections!

Jaron Rochon, a senior in the Archaeology, Geography, and Advanced Anthropology department, is spending his spring semester cataloging artifacts excavated from the Northeast Bastion as part of work completed prior to the building of the Mars Education Center. The artifacts he catalogs will be added to the Ticonderoga Online Collections database for you to browse at home.

War College of the Seven Years' War, May 19-21, 2023 Seminar on the American Revolution, September 22-24, 2023

Featured speakers in 2023 come from across the United States as well as Canada, Scotland, France, the Netherlands, and Serbia. Beyond the international lineup of presenters, these conferences reach a global audience streaming through the Center for Digital History, while also welcoming an in-person audience. Helping Shape the Next Generation of Teachers

THIS FALL, Fort Ticonderoga's "Ticonderoga Tuesdays" teacher webinar series offers two programs geared specifically for pre-service teachers, students in university education programs that are training to become teachers. "Using Historic Documents in the Social Studies Classroom" takes place on Tuesday, October 17, and "Using Historic Objects in the Social Studies Classroom" takes place on Tuesday, November 14.

These webinars supplement collegelevel Social Studies methods courses, providing historical context and strategies for incorporating primary sources of all kinds into classroom teaching. Using documents, artworks, and objects promotes historical thinking skills, essential to understanding and assessing history.

"There is only so much I can do within the confines of our university classroom," says Dr. Kyle Ward, Director of Social Studies Education at Minnesota State University. "Having webinars like the ones presented by Fort Ticonderoga are excellent ways for my pre-service students to learn from other experts in the field as well as having new and innovative teaching/evaluation strategies presented to them. Every student that I have who has participated in one of these Fort Ticonderoga programs has come away a much stronger teaching candidate."

2023 Omohundro Institute-Fort Ticonderoga Fellow

Fort Ticonderoga is delighted to announce **Sara Evenson** as the recipient of the third Omohundro Institute-Fort Ticonderoga Short Term Fellowship! Evenson is a Doctoral Candidate at the University at Albany, and will use the fellowship to explore the creation of kitchen spaces in 18th-century New York, with an emphasis on nontraditional kitchen spaces like those found in the military environment of Fort Ticonderoga. She will explore the archaeological remains of food preparation and eating on the site, as well as examine the ways similar spaces have been preserved and reinterpreted at museums and historic sites.

May 27-28 MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

Join Fort Ticonderoga on Memorial Day weekend, to remember the service of the armed forces of the United States on the very grounds where so many American soldiers fought and sacrificed.

June 17 SCOTS DAY

Discover your own Scottish connection! Visit clan tents and vendors, enjoy Scottish music performed throughout the day, and learn about the service and sacrifice of the Black Watch during the 1758 Battle of Carillon.

July 1-4 INDEPENDENCE 4-DAY WEEKEND

Celebrate freedom by exploring the year 1777 when America was consumed in a war for liberty. Witness a fight for freedom as the Northern Department of the Continental Army fights to keep the great fortress of Ticonderoga from falling into British hands.

▲ July 22-23 BATTLE REENACTMENT: DEFIANCE AND INDEPENDENCE

Join Fort Ticonderoga for this thrilling two-day battle reenactment and witness the epic 1777 siege of American-held Ticonderoga. As British General John Burgoyne tightened the hold on Ticonderoga, experience how American soldiers and artillerymen held the line in the name of liberty. Watch the story unravel around you as the roar of muskets and cannons erupt. Witness a hasty retreat that salvaged the remains of the American Army.

A special evening program on Saturday powerfully explores the night of July 5, 1777, as the Continental Army put into action the orders of the Council of General Officers. Based on the eyewitness accounts, follow the preparations to evacuate Ticonderoga, without alerting the encircling British Army.

August 5-6 SOUND OF 1776

Hear the Fifes & Drums, whose pounding drums and trilling fifes buoyed the spirits of an American Army in 1776! Through musical concerts, living history vignettes, and weapon demonstrations, discover the story of the Northern Continental Army, which rebuilt itself at Ticonderoga beginning in July 1776. See rebellion transform into a war for independence as the Declaration of Independence is dramatically read to troops digging in to desperately defend Ticonderoga.
