2024 is the year 1774! Every day offers great events at Fort Ticonderoga and every year is a new experience.

FT Key to the Continent Guided Tour *30 minutes*

Daily 10:15 a.m., 1:15 p.m., & 3:00 p.m. (Begins at the large American Flag) Discover the incredible story of Ticonderoga and all the great experiences Fort Ticonderoga offers today. Learn about the iconic battles of Carillon & Ticonderoga within the French & Indian War and the Revolutionary War. Explore groundbreaking preservation and reconstruction efforts that allow Fort Ticonderoga to bring to life its heroic tales today and for generations to come.

FT Family Guided Tour 15 minutes

Daily July 1- August 25, 10:40 a.m. & 1:40 p.m. (Begins at the large American Flag) In this family tour, explore the history of this great fort and discover all of the exciting things to do together during your visit!

FT Musket Firing Demonstration 25 minutes

Daily 11:00 a.m. (Demonstration Area)

Meet the British soldiers in 1774 with their muskets and bayonets. Go beyond loading and firing to discuss what traditions remained and what tactical innovations the British Army in North America adopted after the French & Indian War.

FT Fort Ticonderoga Museum Guided Tour 30 minutes

Daily 11:30 a.m. & 2:30 p.m. (Parade Ground)

More than a century of collecting has allowed Fort Ticonderoga to acquire North America's largest and most important collection of 18th-century military material culture. This guided tour will give you the scoop on the most significant, rare, and interesting pieces in the collection.

KG Breaking Ground: A Guided Tour of the Historic Gardens

Daily 11:45 a.m. & 2:45 p.m. (Begins at the King's Garden Greenhouse) From military garrison gardens to a Colonial Revival Garden, explore one of the oldest cultivated landscapes in America. Discover the layers of horticultural history of the Ticonderoga peninsula.

FT Cannon Firing Demonstration 25 minutes

Daily 2:00 p.m. (Demonstration Area)

In addition to soldiers, a handful of British artillerymen maintained the guns of Ticonderoga, a legacy of the great campaigns of the French & Indian War. Discover the British naval training used to safely fire cannons from the fort walls.

Mount Defiance: Witness to History Guided Tour 30 minutes

Daily 4:00 p.m. (Atop Mount Defiance, located at 72 Defiance Street) This graceful mountain overlooking Fort Ticonderoga played a pivotal role during the French & Indian War. Discover the legacy of Mount Defiance by 1774 and its exciting chapters to come in the Revolutionary War.

KG Carillon Boat Tour 75 minutes

(Boarding begins at the Carillon Boat Dock near the King's Garden)

During this 75-minute narrated Carillon tour, our friendly and experienced staff will guide you through centuries of Lake Champlain's stirring maritime heritage. Panoramic mountain vistas will surround you and sonar readings present unforgettable images of shipwrecks below. Ongoing Programs

FT Soldiers' Dinner

At the end of the French & Indian War, the British Army ordered soldiers to grow much of their food. See the hearty meals that soldiers enjoyed with army rations & fresh produce.

FT Musket Maintenance

Each shot of black powder fouled the muskets' moving parts and ate away at its metal, unless thoroughly cleaned. Watch as hot water, grease, and a little brick dust keep these weapons working; lock, stock, and barrel.

FT Tailoring

On the eve of the Revolutionary War, clothing soldiers was an efficient science within the British Army. See how economy and comfort were balanced at the end of a tailors' needle in British garrisons all around the globe.

FT Shoemaking

Examine the construction of British soldiers' shoes in 1774 and discover the science of recreating original shoes from shipwrecks. Flex the supple calfskin of shoe uppers and rap on the hard soles as you explore how these shoes were repaired wherever soldiers marched or rowed.

See Red Devon oxen in action, hauling supplies for the British garrison at Ticonderoga. Watch for sheep grazing uneven terrain as part of our stewardship of this historic landscape today. Discover how cattle, horses, and sheep were a common part of the peacetime landscape surrounding Fort Ticonderoga.

KG Maritime Trades

Bateaux and bigger vessels were part of each British garrison along vital waterways like Lake Champlain. Explore the carpentry, sail-making, and rigging work used to build and maintain these flat bottomed wooden boats, even as shipwrecks loomed out of the lake in the King's Shipyard at Ticonderoga.

KG Soldiers' Gardening

Gardening was a common military duty within the British Army, but after the French & Indian War, these gardens became more elaborate and important for keeping peacetime soldiers fed, wherever they served in America.

KG Centuries of Seeds and Stories

Our friendly staff will be your guide to beautiful flowers and the layers of history found in the King's Garden. Leisurely stroll brick paths in the 20th-century walled garden, a tribute to the soldiers who fought here and a testament to America's first historic preservation effort. Ongoing Programs, continued

Fifes & Drums of Fort Ticonderoga
